Remember the big picture. There are a number of early childhood philosophies, but they tend to fall into two broad categories in the United States. The first philosophy is learning through discovery, which includes programs with a focus on child-directed activities. Teachers serve as guides and plan activities based on children's developmental levels. The second philosophy centers on programs that are more academically based, and typically include drill and practice components.



Consider family based program or commercial center. Keep in mind teacher to student ratios.
